


Facilitating radical change in education, health, and entrepreneurship



Entrepreneurship

- 1,187 out-of-school youth trained
- 72% of participants were young women
- 180% increase in business ownership (from baseline)
- 11,471 clinic visits
- 2,279 cervical cancer screens
- 1,356 child immunizations

DIY DO IT YOURSELF CLUBS

Concept

In the DIY Clubs, secondary school students in Uganda are running the show. They identify challenges in their schools and communities, and take action to address them. Through hands-on service projects they learn how to communicate and work in teams, develop greater self-confidence and agency, and create a positive school climate. Teachers learn how to design more engaging classrooms that incorporate meaningful student participation. DIY creates an environment where young people have the freedom to question, innovate, and make decisions about their own learning.


Highlighted Service Projects

Reusable Sanitary Pads: Providing menstrual hygiene management education and making reusable sanitary pads as an entrepreneurial venture.

My Health, My Concern: Promoting awareness among students about sexual and reproductive health through the performing arts.

Save My Environment: Providing environmental education and recycling waste to make and sell charcoal briquettes as an income generating activity.

YOUTH INTEREST GROUPS

Music, Dance & Drama

The Drama Group performs health-focused skits for community members and primary school students in collaboration with the NAWEC Clinic. In 2019 the team conducted 21 outreaches engaging over 1,899 people. Topics included: cancer screening, immunization, family planning, nutrition, and gender-based violence.

Peer Health Education

Sixteen Komo Peer Health Educators provided health education to fill existing knowledge gaps. They conducted 66 outreaches in 6 schools, reaching over 389 primary students. Members also held community radio talks, sensitizing listeners about nutrition and breastfeeding.


Entrepreneurship

Twenty-five Entrepreneurship group members have saved over 4,000 USD that they will use to start up small businesses. As an example, some members have taken loans to start a business making floor mats. The profit margin on each floor mat is between 10-15 USD.

Community Health Workers (CHW)

- 50 CHWs recruited
- 15,000 community members supported
- Three government health centres engaged
- Family planning, ANC, cervical cancer, malaria



NAWEC Clinic

- 11,471 clinic visits
- 4.387 lab visits
- 7,391 lab tests performed
- \$54,300 annual revenue
- 28% costs covered by revenue

Cervical Cancer

- 2,279 cervical cancer screens
- 110 cervical cancer treatments
- 308 HPV vaccinations

Maternal and Child Health

- 1,648 ANC/PNC visits
- 1,054 family planning clients
- 1,356 child immunizations

Outreach

- 3,497 community clients
- 1,380 hepatitis B vaccinations
